Dear Reader,

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the Summer 2019 edition of Our Trust. You only have to flick through to see the amazingly diverse range of activities and opportunities our students have in our schools. I would like to thank all our staff for their efforts in providing these opportunities to allow our students to flourish not only in the classroom but in life.

As we draw to the end of the academic year it is amazing for me to reflect on the fact that I have now led our Trust for 3 years, and what an amazing 3 years it has been. We have seen a significant growth in our Trust from about 6,000 students to 8,000+ students and 11 to 17 schools. We have had 10 Ofsted inspections and amazingly gone from only 36% of our schools having an Ofsted judgement of Good or better to 82% today.


Our KS1 results have consistently been in line with National outcomes – this is fantastic given that as a Trust we support communities well above national for levels of deprivation. We have seen year on year improvements in our Primary KS2 SATs outcomes – this year, for the first time, we will be at national for students achieving age expected in combined (Reading, Writing and Maths) and again, for the first time, will be above national for progress in Writing and Maths.

Our secondary outcomes are consistently high with our Trust being in the Top 10 performers nationwide at GCSE and A Level every year. It is also worth noting that we are one of the best performing Trusts in the country for the progress of students from deprived backgrounds – truly transforming life chances.

We are the leading Trust in the country for the use of metacognition in the classroom and have gone from 2 schools being accredited Thinking Schools by Exeter University in 2016 to 10, with another 2 expecting accreditation by September taking us to 12. Together, we have achieved all this at the same time as delivering the fantastic learning and growth experiences for our students that you can see in every copy of Our Trust over the last few years.

So, what next?

Lord Agnew, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for the School System, and the Rt Hon Nick Gibb MP, Minister of State for School Standard, have written to our Trust to congratulate our staff and pupils on the excellent progress our pupils are making.

The letter recognises our Key Stage 4 results that were published 24 January 2019 in the multi-academy trust performance tables showing a Progress 8 score of 0.32, and that our Trust is amongst the top 10 in England in terms of progress our pupils make between Key Stage 2 and the end of Key Stage 4.

Further reading also shows that the DfE are keen to see how the important role we play in supporting schools in our Trust can be developed to support schools beyond our Trust, whether academies or maintained schools.

We strive daily to transform the life chances of our children and young adults and are delighted to be praised for the hard work and professionalism we put into producing such high standards.

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ROCHESTER GRAMMAR SCHOOL STUDENTS CELEBRATE EXCELLENT IB RESULTS

Students at Rochester Grammar School are celebrating after they again achieved excellent results in the international Baccalaureate (IB) this year – ahead of the school offering the high-quality qualification exclusively in its sixth form from September 2020.

The overall average score for students at RGS, part of our high-performing Trust, was 36 - equivalent to A*A*AA at A-Level. The excellent individual results mean many RGS students have won their first choice of university, including at some of the best universities in the country, or will undertake highly prized training or apprenticeships with leading firms.

The universities include Bath, London School of Economics, Warwick, King's College London, Lancaster, Imperial College London and Bristol.

Some of the exceptional individual results this year included:

• Arwen Pike – Arwen gained 45 points, having studied four Highers instead of the usual three, in French, Spanish, English Literature and Theatre Studies. She intends to pursue drama. Arwen's achievement was matched by only 260 people worldwide in 2018, equating to 0.4% of the global IB Diploma candidates each year.

• Elizabeth Castell – Elizabeth gained 42 points, with Highers in Anthropology, History and English Literature for which she gained 7, 7 and 6 points respectively. She holds an offer to read Sociology at the London School of Economics.

• Caitlin Jackson – Caitlin obtained 43 points, with 7s in each of her Highers of Biology, English Literature and History. She will take up her place to study Liberal Arts at King's College London in September.

• Damilola Matthew – Damilola, who joined Rochester Grammar School from The Victory Academy (also part of our Trust) at the start of Year 12, obtained 35 points altogether. This included Highers of Biology, Psychology and Chemistry, where she achieved a 7, 6 and 5 respectively. She will take up her place to study Medicine at Aston University.

Arwen and Damilola also formed part of the Executive Officer team during their time at Rochester Grammar School. The IB is studied in the Sixth Form at Rochester Grammar School as an alternative to A levels, and has been offered at RGS for the last 12 years. Students must take six subjects, incorporating both sciences and humanities.

Rochester Grammar School is routinely ranked the best in the country for IB and from September 2020 it will be exclusively offered, with all students joining the sixth form from then on taking it.



Joanna Wadey, Acting Head of School at Rochester Grammar School, said:

I am absolutely delighted for all of this year's cohort of IB students for achieving such excellent results in a world-leading and rigorous qualification. We have watched their hard work and commitment first-hand and their success is truly deserved.

The IB encourages students to deeply engage with their subjects, developing their ability to learn and readying them for university-level material. Their accomplishments this year really show the long-term value of studying the IB and we are incredibly proud of them.

The calibre of the results that this year's cohort of students has achieved is really fantastic and reflects the level of effort and dedication that went into their studies.

The Victory Academy and Holcombe Grammar school students are looking forward to taking to the seas, as they are due to set sail this September.

A group of students from both Chatham secondary schools will take command of the sail boat Faramir for five days, travelling from Chatham to Portsmouth in a trip organised by the charity Cirdan Sailing Trust, which helps disadvantaged young people experience life at sea.

Alongside learning to sail, they will develop their team building, leadership and communication skills, as well as boost their confidence, self-esteem and resilience. The students will be taught all practical and mental skills needed by the boat's crew and the jobs will be rotated so everyone will be able to control each aspect of the boat, working beside a trained skipper to become a competent crew.

The trip will forge stronger links with Portsmouth-based schools and The Portsmouth Academy will spend the following week sailing the boat back to Medway.

Every student taking part will receive a Voyage Certificate and some will also achieve Royal Yachting Association (RYA) accreditation.

This helps to encourage and promote positivity and engagement, allowing students of all abilities and skill set to be recognised for their individual best.

Last term also saw the launch of our exciting new House system with Heads of House and Mr J Partridge, Assistant Principal, delivering launch assemblies to all students and staff. The Houses have been named after famous patrons who are shining examples of people who gave their BEST to society and helped shape the world today. They have Florence Nightingale, Marie Curie, Stephen Hawking, Isambard Brunel and Elizabeth Carter, all of whom were chosen by students and staff from a selection of outstanding role models.

The House system will give students the opportunity to positively engage with competitions, charity fund raising as well as fostering a positive community ethos. The Academy has chosen the charity Macmillan Cancer Research as the whole school charity for this year, with a number of events planned including their maths teacher Mr G Dixon completing an Iron Man Challenge to raise money.



MEDWAY SECONDARY SCHOOL TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Congratulations to Hanna Miller who has received the prestigious award of Medway Secondary School Teacher of the Year.

Hanna juggles many roles and responsibilities on a daily basis and yet still produces excellent results in the classroom. This is proven by the fact that last year, 100% of students taking GCSE level Sport achieved a grade 8 or 9.

Hanna is the Assistant Principal of Teaching and Learning across the Trust, covering schools in Medway, Deal and Portsmouth. She delivers 'Thinking and Metacognition' to all of our schools, helping students to build self-awareness and resilience.

MINI TENNIS CHAMPIONS


Year 3 and 4 children at Meon Junior School have taken part in a mini tennis and racket skills event at the Mountbatten Centre in Portsmouth.

SHAPING THEIR SUCCESS

Our first sets of results for this academic year have been announced and we are delighted to share with you some highlights across our Key Stages prior to the summer. What better way to end the year than with our students reaching their goals and Being Their Best! As a Trust serving communities with exceptionally high pockets of deprivation, the work and hours that our staff have dedicated to each and every student is evident in our goal to Transform Life Chances. Our staff at each and every one of our Trust's schools should all be very proud.

The following results demonstrate the successes achieved at our schools:

- Good Level of development: Moorings Way and Cedar Children's Academy achieved two of the highest outcomes for GLD with 77% and 75% of children achieving the required standard in their early learning goals. The national average last year was 72%.
- KS1 Phonics Screening: New Horizons and Cedar Children's Academies achieved our top two outcomes across Trust schools with 89% and 86% of children achieving expected. The national average last year was 82%.
- KS1 Y2 SATs: Penhale Infant School and New Horizons achieved incredible outcomes for Maths at 81% and 86% respectively for achieving expected. The National Average last year was 76%.
- KS2 Y6 SATs: New Horizons have been celebrating the success of their first ever Year 6 cohort with 63% of students achieving Greater Depth in reading, and a progress average of +6.60 with Maths Greater Depth at 72% and a progress average of +6.91 which is outstanding. All Faiths Children's Academy only have 25 students in the year with 72% achieving expected outcomes in reading, writing and Maths with a progress score of +2.59. Isambard have achieved a significant lift in their KS2 SATs results, most notably in Maths with a huge 19% achieving the expected standard. Newbridge Junior school have also increased the percentage of children achieving Greater Depth in reading (78%), writing (82%) and maths (87%), whilst Meon Junior school increased the percentage of children achieving Greater Depth in reading and writing.
- IB: RGS is routinely ranked the best in the country for its IB outcomes and this year did not falter. Students obtained an average points score of 36 out of 45 which is equivalent to A*A*AA at A level. Their Year 13s move on to a variety of top universities. One student also achieved the highest points score possible of 45, which equates to only 0.4% of the IB Diploma candidates each year. A huge achievement!

We still have our summer GCSE and A Level results which will be announced in August, however I am sure you will all share our delight in the outcomes we have achieved for our children detailed above.

D-DAY 75TH ANNIVERSARY

The 75th Anniversary of D-Day has captured the hearts of so many who have shown their respect to the fallen.

All of our schools have shown their admiration in many ways from creative arts to performances of dance and song.

PLASTIC FREE DAY



The judges, impressed by her knowledge and presentation, selected her as overall winner of the new competition. The competition provides a platform to offer students a greater opportunity to access the competitive field of commercial law.

Children at New Horizons Children's Academy spent a week looking at and celebrating a variety of different cultures.

The year 3 children began the week with a dance workshop and in art they used silhouette to recreate an African sunset scene and paints to replicate African tapestries. Year 4 were able to taste new foods with an African heritage as well as researching African artists and styles.

Years 5 and 6 delved into South America, with Year 5 pupils learning about Brazil, getting involved in the incredible colours of their country – through the creation of parrots, their own Christ the Redeemer statue (with a slight variation) and carnival masks – both big and small. Year 6 found out all about Peru and created information posters. In art they designed their own masks inspired by the traditional Peruvian masks and they learnt some Peruvian dance.

A fantastic week where children could really get involved with a huge variety of activities and cultures.

DEAF AWARENESS WEEK

All Faiths Children's Academy's Treetop pupils have been using their Personal Understanding of Deafness (PUD) sessions to present at Collective Worship.

In preparation for Deaf Awareness week, the Treetop pupils (Deaf children in Provision) used their weekly PUD sessions (Personal Understanding of Deafness) to decide, write and rehearse what they wanted their peers to know about being deaf. The presentation they offered in collective worship was very much their own work. The school also set a challenge for all classes to learn the British Sign Language (BSL) two-handed manual alphabet and to be able to fingerspell their names. The younger pupils were challenged to think about their own sign name and what that would be and to learn the rainbow song in BSL. The school also signed and sang "Greatest Day" which was this year's Sign2Sing song.

The Early Years classes already sign regularly and are learning key phrases in sign language as part of their daily routine. Many of our mainstream pupils have developed their own use of sign language alongside their deaf peers as there is always a Signing Specialist Teaching Assistant in every class. This was a particularly important week for the school, as it laid the groundwork for launching the BSL curriculum. From September 2019 all classes will have BSL as part of their curriculum, thus enhancing the inclusivity of our learning environment and supporting access to the social and emotional aspects of learning as well as academic, which in turn helps to develop emotional resilience and well-being. A number of our mainstream staff are currently studying for their Level 1 and we wish them all the best for upcoming assessments.



ALUMNI STUDENTS SHORTLISTED FOR THE RCA HELEN HAMLYN FIXPERTS AWARD


The Victory Academy are delighted to hear that two of their alumni have been shortlisted for the RCA Helen Hamlyn Fixperts Award.
